THE PREMISE

What Happened to One Man Happened to a Generation

Season One followed one man's journey out of inherited assumptions. Season Two asks the harder question: why did he have them in the first place? The answer is not personal. It is structural. The systems that replaced sovereign inquiry with expert dependency were not accidents of culture. They were deliberate architectural decisions — and their consequences are visible in every institution that shapes modern life.

Season Two expands the frame from the personal to the civilizational. The viewer who recognized themselves in Season One now recognizes the system that produced the recognition.

THE DIAGNOSIS

Six Things the School Actually Teaches

Drawing on the work of John Taylor Gatto — New York City Teacher of the Year who resigned publicly and wrote *Dumbing Us Down* — Season Two documents what the Prussian education model was explicitly designed to produce: not independent thinkers, but compliant workers. The curriculum everyone remembers is not the curriculum that mattered. The curriculum that mattered was delivered between the subjects.

This is not conspiracy. It is documented institutional history. The design is on the record. Season Two puts it on screen.

THE ARCHITECTURE

How Expert Dependency Was Built

Medicine. Law. Finance. Education. Nutrition. Each domain examined through the same diagnostic question: at what point did the individual lose the capacity — and then the permission — to evaluate the evidence for themselves? The Flexner Report. The bar exam. The financial advisor licensing regime. The nutritional guidelines that changed without evidence. Each one a door that closed between the individual and direct knowledge.

PROPOSED EPISODE STRUCTURE

Four to Six Episodes — Producer's Discretion

Episode 01 · The Prussian Blueprint

Where the modern education model came from, what it was designed to produce, and how successfully it achieved its actual objectives.

Episode 02 · The Expert Class

How credentialism replaced competence. When the credential became more important than the knowledge it was supposed to certify.

Episode 03 · The Medical Monoculture

The Flexner Report and the systematic exclusion of terrain-based medicine. What was lost. Who benefited from the loss.

Episode 04 · The Information Architecture

How the media ecosystem was built to manage consensus rather than produce it honestly. The difference between a free press and a managed one.

Episode 05 · The Way Out

What sovereign inquiry actually looks like inside a system designed to prevent it. The individuals who found it. How they did it. What it cost them.
